

## School Transit Subsidy (KD0)

*District Law 2-152, the School Transit Subsidy Act of 1978, as amended, authorizes the payment of a subsidy for the transportation of District students to and from school and related educational activities. The legislation prescribing the eligibility requires that students reside in the District of Columbia; be under 19 years of age except for students with disabilities for whom reduced fares shall be available through the end of the semester when the student reaches 22 years of age; be enrolled in a public, private or parochial school in the District of Columbia; and need to use Metrobus or Metrorail for travel to and from school and related educational activities in the District.*

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### FY 2001 Proposed Budget by Control Center

The basic unit of budgetary and financial control in the District's financial management system is a control center. The School Transit Subsidy is comprised of one control center that serves as the major component of the agency's budget.

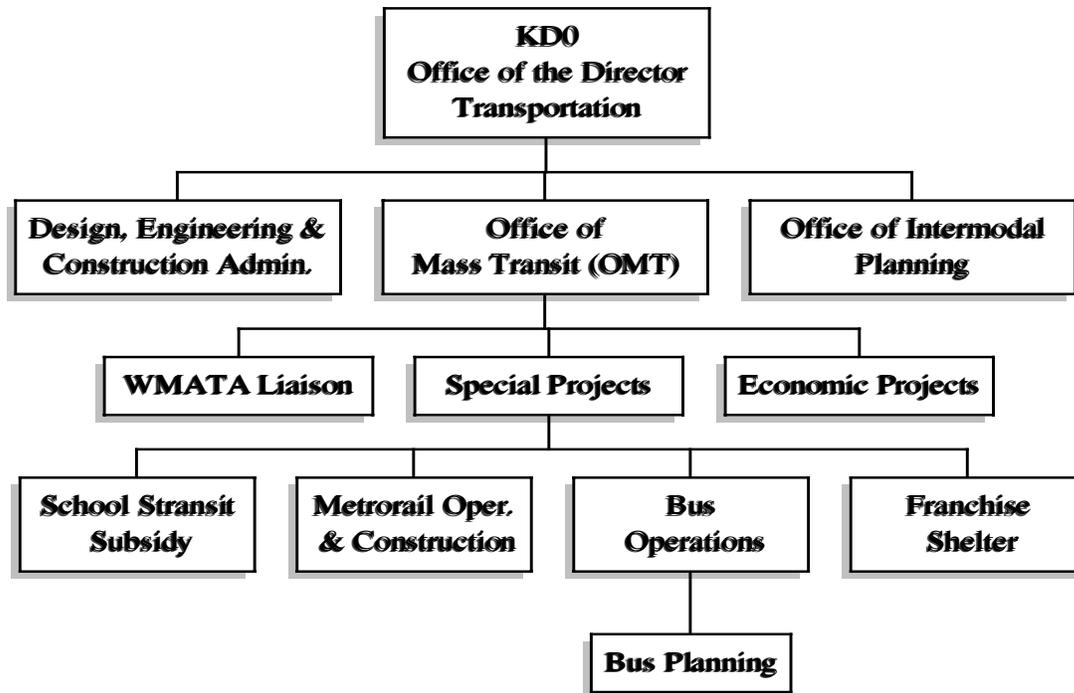

## Agency Overview and Organization

The Department of Public Works' Office of Mass Transit (OMT) administers the School Transit Subsidy program in conjunction with the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority and the District of Columbia Public Schools. OMT staff is charged with: certifying eligible students to travel on Metrobus and Metrorail; issuing student discount cards to permit subsidized travel; distributing application blanks for purchasing discounted bus tokens; administering the special program for student travel during summers and weekends; verifying the monthly student ridership; and processing the quarterly subsidy payments to the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (WMATA).

**FY 2001 Proposed Operating Budget**

The School Transit Subsidy Operating Budget is composed of Nonpersonal Services (NPS). For the Subsidy, the only object class of expenditures is subsidies and transfers.

Authorized spending levels present the dollars by revenue type. The only revenue type for the School Transit Subsidy is Local (tax and non-tax revenue not earmarked for a particular purpose).

**Agency Funding Summary**

The proposed FY 2001 operating budget *for all funding sources* is \$3,000,000, a decrease of \$450,000 or 1.3 percent, from the FY 2000 approved budget. The School Transit Subsidy receives funding from local sources.

- **Local.** The proposed *local* budget is \$3,000,000, a decrease of \$450,000. The entire decrease is in nonpersonal services.

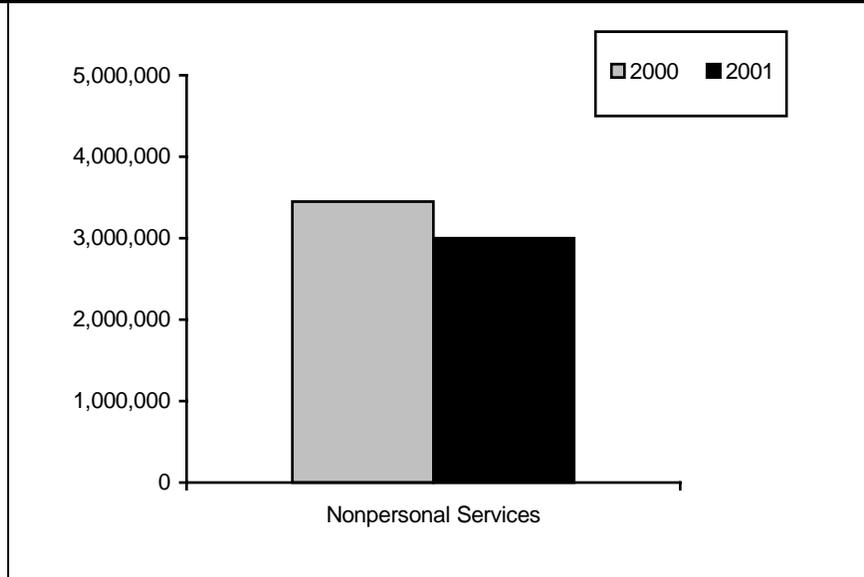
The change in nonpersonal services is comprised of:

- (\$450,000) is a decrease due to a reduction in student ridership.
