**Conclusion**

Funds are sufficient in the FY 2010 through FY 2013 budget and financial plan period.

**Background**

The proposed legislation would amend the District of Columbia Uniform Controlled Substances Act of 1981<sup>1</sup> to make it a felony for any person to knowingly or intentionally possess the drug phencyclidine (PCP) in liquid form unless the substance was obtained directly from, or pursuant to, a valid prescription or an order from a practitioner; and would impose a maximum penalty of three years imprisonment and a \$5,000 fine for conviction of the felony. It also would impose a maximum fine of \$1,000 and a mandatory-minimum term of imprisonment of ten days for driving under the influence of PCP.

**Financial Plan Impact**

Funds are sufficient in the FY 2010 through FY 2013 budget and financial plan period. No additional resources would be needed to implement the proposed legislation. Any fines collected would be deposited into the Crime Victims Compensation Fund, which is maintained as a separate fund in the Treasury of the United States.<sup>2</sup>
