Conclusion

Funds are not sufficient in the fiscal year 2020 through fiscal year 2023 budget and financial plan to implement the bill. The bill will cost \$352,000 in fiscal year 2020.

Background

All persons proposing to offer or develop new institutional health service or obligate capital expenditures for a medical or health asset are required to apply for a Certificate of Need (CON) from the Department of Health's State Health Planning and Development Agency (SHPDA). A CON demonstrates a public need for the new health service, facility, or expenditure. Along with the application, CON applicants must pay an application fee of three percent of the proposed capital expenditure. Fees range from a minimum \$5,000 to a maximum \$300,000 per applicant.

The bill requires¹ SHPDA to refund all CON application fees paid by Vision to Learn. Vision to Learn plans to provide free eye glasses to children and youth in the District of Columbia attending a public school, public charter school, or private school. The bill also requires² SHPDA to waive and refund

the \$52,050 CON application fee paid by Iona Senior Services for a project located at 3303 Stanton Road, SE.

The bill establishes³ a maximum CON application fee that can be collected from Community of Hope for a project located at 2120 Bladensburg Road, NE. The maximum fee is set at \$5,000.

Financial Plan Impact

Funds are not sufficient in the fiscal year 2020 through fiscal year 2023 budget and financial plan to implement the bill. The bill will cost \$352,000 in fiscal year 2020.

CON fee revenue is collected and deposited into a non-lapsing State Health Planning and Development Fund (Fund)⁴ which is used to cover the annual salary and operating expenses of SHPDA. The bill will reduce the amount of revenue deposited into the Fund in fiscal year 2020 which will prevent SHPDA from having sufficient funds to cover the cost of its salary and operating expenses. To ensure that SHPDA can meet its annual budgetary obligations, the agency will need an additional \$352,000 in fiscal year 2020 to offset lost revenue.
