Conclusion

Funds are not sufficient in the fiscal year 2018 through fiscal year 2021 budget and financial plan to implement the bill. The bill's implementation will cost \$184,000 in fiscal year 2018 and \$763,000 over the four-year financial plan period.

Background

Motor vehicle owners must have their vehicles inspected by the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) for exhaust emissions every two years. A vehicle that fails the DMV inspection has twenty calendar days to make the necessary repairs and return to DMV for a retest at no additional cost.²

The bill allows the owner of a vehicle that fails DMV's exhaust emissions test to receive a retest from the District repair shop³ that performs the necessary vehicle repairs. If the vehicle passes the subsequent test, then DMV will issue an inspection sticker for the vehicle.

Financial Plan Impact

Funds are not sufficient in the fiscal year 2018 through fiscal year 2021 budget and financial plan to implement the bill. DMV manages the re-inspection process through its centralized facility at 1001 Half Street, S.W. A decentralized re-inspection process would require DMV to provide a new level of

oversight on the process. DMV will need to ensure repair stations are using the appropriate equipment, fees are being paid, systems are connected as needed, fraud is mitigated, and valid inspection stickers are issued. This will require one new DMV investigator at a cost of \$76,000 annually.

The Department of Energy and the Environment (DOEE) currently monitors and inspects the DMV facility under its vehicle emissions inspection and maintenance program that is part of its State Implementation Plan (SIP)⁴ required under the Federal Clean Air Act.⁵ The proposed decentralization program requires DOEE to work with the Environmental Protection Agency to amend its SIP in a process that could take 18-24 months. DOEE requires an additional environmental protection specialist to work through the SIP amendment process and conduct performance audits on any repair shops that choose to participate in the re-inspection program. This specialist will cost approximately \$115,000 annually.
