Conclusion

Funds are sufficient in the fiscal year 2023 through fiscal year 2026 budget and financial plan to implement the bill.

Background

The bill entitles¹ District Government employees to ten days of bereavement leave without loss of pay, leave, or service credit when the employee suffers the death of their minor child or a stillbirth. District employees are currently entitled to three days of bereavement leave for the death of a child.

Financial Plan Impact

Funds are sufficient in the fiscal year 2023 through fiscal year 2026 budget and financial plan to implement the bill.

The new paid leave may require certain District agencies to use temporary personnel or overtime to substitute for essential workers who take leave for child deaths and stillbirths. However, temporary

personnel and overtime budgets are likely to already account for such costs if affected workers have been taking unpaid or other available leave. Additionally, the number of stillbirths² and child deaths³ in the District indicates that only a small number of employees would be affected each year. No additional resources are required to implement the bill.
